#### **Student Learning Conference**

You would have received a letter from the College about the new Student Learning Conference for students in Years 7 to 10. This is the replacement for the old Parent Teacher night held at this time of the year.

The Conference is more in line with our learning philosophy and will save some time as each family will only met with their Learning Advisor rather than all teachers. The interviews will be about ten minutes long and your child rather than the teacher will lead them. The Learning Advisor will have some prompt questions to guide the night but each child will be leading the discussion.

The Student Learning Conference will be held on Tuesday the 22<sup>nd</sup> of March and will be held in:

Year 7 - G10

Year 8 - F1 / F2

Year 9 - B2 / B3

Year 10 - Library

Therese May (Careers) will also be in the library

Learning Support will be in G8

Your child's Leader of Learning will be available for any families that wish to speak to them.

We are trialing this new approach for this evening only and will be asking students, parents and teachers to provide feedback after the event.

#### **Technology**

While reading *children* and the use of technology, I came across an article about children using technology at home and some guidelines for use. I have included some of the points, which might help families with technology use at home.

#### Time limits

Time limits are not always effective due to the psychological flow children experience when using technology. Simply stating 'your ten minutes is up' can be meaningless, especially for younger children for whom time is an abstract concept. It can be more advantageous to set a limit based on the game or activity. For example 'You can watch two Giggle and Hoot episodes' or 'You can play two days and one night in your Minecraft game'. Before commencing screen time, children and parents could agree on the duration for play and set the countdown timer using the clock on an iOS device. Instead of an alarm parents can select Stop Playing, which locks the device at the end of the time period. It is also helpful for parents to cognitively prime their child by communicating a warning when the allocated time is almost finished. A transition activity such as jumping on the trampoline or eating afternoon tea can be particularly helpful to move children from screen time to homework. It is also important for the child to take responsibility for the end of screen time. For example the child can be responsible for turning off the television or putting the device away. By putting the locus of control in the child's hands they are managing the technology rather than technology managing them.

#### Sleep

Hand held devices are particularly problematic in causing sleep disorders. These devices omit blue light, which inhibits the body in creating melatonin. This accumulated sleep debt can significantly impact cognitive development. Therefore it is important to limit screen time in the 90 minutes before going to sleep. If hand held devices must be used, then it can be helpful to lower the brightness on the device and encourage an increase in distance. Watching television later at night is better than a hand held device, because of the physical distance and level of blue light. In addition bedrooms should be tech free zones. A family media management plan can be helpful in establishing what, how, when, where and why technology can be used at home. It can be helpful to have a landing zone, which is essentially a bed-time location for devices. This can be used to do

a technology roll call to ensure children do not use their devices throughout the night.

#### **Posture**

Children who spend extended hours in front of screens are at risk of developing muscular skeletal problems and postural issues. Parents must remind children to hold their device at eye level. Lying on your tummy is an ideal position as it keeps the device at eye level whilst the head and neck are upright. Sitting on a beanbag is another good strategy for maintaining good posture when using hand held devices. In addition parents should encourage children to blink more when using screens to keep their eyes lubricated.

#### **About NAPLAN in 2016**

Across the language conventions, numeracy and reading tests Items in the tests will be based primarily on knowledge, understanding and skills gained from the prior year. As in previous NAPLAN tests, a small percentage of additional content from the year of testing and following year of testing will be included. This is to ensure the range of items in the test allows all students to demonstrate their capability.

The wording of the item descriptors (these describe the skills and knowledge tested in NAPLAN) that schools will receive with their students' results in August 2016 will be directly linked to a content description in the Australian Curriculum: English and the Australian Curriculum: Mathematics.

#### Why is numeracy important?

Numeracy enables you to develop logical thinking and reasoning strategies in your daily life. We need numeracy to solve problems and make sense of time, numbers, patterns and shapes for activities like cooking, reading a map or bill, reading instructions and even playing sport.

#### Ways to support your child's numeracy development


Research has shown that children's motivation and achievement improve when their parents or carers are involved in their education.


There are many everyday things you can do to encourage numeracy learning. These include:

- encouraging your child to use mathematical language how much, how big, how small, how many
- discussing the use of numbers, patterns and shapes in your day-to
   -day life numbers found on library books, spatial patterns or
   shapes in playgrounds, in the home and architecture
- talking about occasions when you are using mathematics in daily jobs and real-life situations — cooking, map reading, building and playing sport
- exploring situations using money such as shopping, budgets and credit cards
- estimating, measuring and comparing lengths and heights, how heavy or light things are and how much containers hold
- talking about different ways to solve a problem
- using everyday tools like tape measures or kitchen scales and discussing the units of measure
- asking 'does that make sense?', 'is the answer reasonable?' or 'what other ways could we do this?'
- observing and using timetables, calendars and clocks for different purposes like study periods, holiday planning and catching public transport
- helping your child to work out how much things cost and what change they will receive
- playing number games using magazines, books, newspapers and number plates



Auditions will be in the music rooms of each campus during Week 3 of Term 2.



## **EXPLORING THE JAPANESE CULTURE**



On the 24th of February, the Year 11 and 12 Japanese class, accompanied by Ms Mizukami and Mr Roseby, travelled to the city. We went to the Monkey Baa Theatre in Darling Harbour, the Kinokuniya Bookshop, MUJI, a Japanese convenience store and Mizuya Japanese Restaurant and Karaoke.

First, we met at Blacktown Station at 8:45am to catch the train to the City. We got off at Town Hall and walked straight to the Monkey Baa Theatre. Our College and many others were there to watch a lecture/traditional Japanese performance called "Jewels of Kyoto". This was run by the Japan Foundation. Two Geiko-san and two Maiko-san travelled the distance to Sydney from Kyoto to give a lecture on the traditional Japanese culture.

First, there was a photo opportunity so we could take photos of them. Then, there was Geiko-san and Maiko-san lecture consisting of information about what the Geiko and Maiko do in their everyday life, and the dialect of the people from Kyoto, as well as how young Japanese women train to become Maiko and Geiko. The performances had traditional Japanese folk singing, followed by the playing of traditional Japanese instruments and dancing. We also learnt two Japanese games, Tora Tora Tora and an Traditional Tea House game. We learnt that those games were usually played only

for adults. If a person loses the game, they need to drink a glass of sake (Japanese rice wine). Maiko-san and Geiko-san allowed the students to have a chance to experience the games. It was very educational and entertaining. We all learnt something so special from Kyoto and it was so much fun!

Next, we went to the Kinokuniya Bookshop to buy the Japanese dictionary and we had some leisure time. But the furigana dictionaries were out of stock. So, unfortunately we were unable to purchase them. We were allowed to also buy some stuff at the Kinokuniya Bookshop and MUJI (selling Japanese natural and simple design compliments).

After that we went to the Mizuya Japanese restaurant and Karaoke to try Japanese cuisine and sing Karaoke. The food there was delicious. We were able to choose one lunch from the set menu. We also ordered special Japanese drinks, such as Green Tea Latte. It was very tasty with the whipped cream and the sweet red bean compliment. It balanced out the strong taste of the Matcha (green tea). We had great fun singing Japanese Karaoke even though it was more difficult than we expected. But in the end everyone enjoyed their time singing.

All in all, it was a fun and informative day about Japan in different aspects ranging from dialects to the performing arts. Now we know how much Japanese culture we can experience in Sydney. We look forward to having another great Japanese excursion again next year!

# **WESTERN SYDNEY UNIVERSITY FAST FORWARD YEAR 12 CONFERENCE**

On Friday the 4<sup>th</sup> of March eight Year 12 students attended the Western Sydney University Fast Forward Conference held at Rooty Hill RSL.

The Conference began with an address from Western Sydney University Chancellor Professor Peter Shergold AC who informed the students that following your dream was essential to success. Professor Shergold also shared with the students his belief of the importance of a tertiary education for success in tomorrow's world.

The day then broke into three sessions. The students were able to choose their sessions, which included:

- Inventing the future
- Visual Communication Design and Beyond
- UWS Scholarships
- Everything you need to know about signing up for the Navy, Army or Air Force
- UWS Solar Car
- Robotics in Action
- Course Information Session.

During the Conference Year 12 students were introduced to the 2016 Fast Forward Scholarship recipients. One of the four recipients is Eden Corbett, a graduate from St Andrews College. Eden was a member of the first Fast Forward Group at St Andrews College and achieved an ATAR over 90. Along with her ATAR, Eden's application to her studies and her plan for the future helped secure her \$20,000 scholarship.



The Conference closed with Professor James Arvanitakis who shared with the students his struggle with academic study, in particular a time when his first academic course co-ordinator advised him to rethink his plans of achieving a Bachelors Degree.



Professor Arvanitakis indeed did poorly in his first semester but with perseverance he continued his academic studies and now holds a PhD. In 2012 Professor Arvanitakis was awarded the Prime Minister's University Teacher of the Year Award – Australia's most prestigious teaching award.

Year 12 students from many Greater Western Sydney schools were certainly inspired by the wisdom of Professor James Arvanitakis.

Students who attended were:

## WRITING FOCUS OF THE WEEK

For most adults, writing a paragraph is a natural thing. Yet children struggle with getting the structure just right. How you begin your writing is very important in order to ensure that you focus on what you are writing about. So today I am focusing on the paragraph.

The Topic Sentence is supposed to tell you the topic you are writing about. Let's look at this prompt:

Which type of <u>technology</u> gets <u>teens</u> into the <u>biggest trouble</u>? Write a persuasive paragraph about it.

Where do you start? It is important to look at the key words in the question. In this case the underlined words are the key to the prompt. When writing your topic sentence you should begin with a sentence that includes the key words. For example:

"The technology that gets teens into the biggest trouble is ..."

The topic sentence should always be clear and should **NOT** include the reasons why something is the case. These reasons why are called details and they should be included in their own sentences. If I gave this question to students I would see some responses like this:

"The technology that gets teens into trouble is the internet because ...."

In the above example the student is going to give me all of their reasons in one long sentence. When they finish this sentence, what will they write? They will be at risk of repeating themselves in order to make a full paragraph. Below is a simple graphic organiser to help students structure their paragraphs.

By separating the topic sentence from the details, the writing should flow more easily. The final sentence should conclude your ideas and link back to the question.

## **READING FOCUS OF THE WEEK**

## Connecting

Reading can be a challenge; especially if you are reading about a topic that you are not familiar with. One way in which we can help make sense of what we read is *Connecting*.

Connecting means that we try to make sense of the text by relating it to what we already know about the topic. We connect it to previous stories; what we know about the world; and our own life events.


You can connect to a text before and during the reading of a text. When we pre-read a text by looking at the pictures and the headings we are using our existing knowledge to guess what it will be about; we are *connecting* our existing knowledge to it.

As parents, you can ask your children to look at the text and ask what they may already know about the text. It's possible that they may know of a real life situation that fits the example, or they have watched a television show or documentary that told them something about the topic. Students who enjoy watching shows such as 'Horrible Histories' and 'Mythbusters' can bring existing knowledge into the classroom.

The more we connect what we already know, the more we can learn!
