HOW TO ASK FOR SPONSORSHIP

HSC CHEMISTRY EXCURSION TO WARRAGAMBA DAM AND ORCHID HILLS



Water is one of the most important resources used by man. It is used everyday for consumption, recreation, transport, industry and agriculture. These human activities have a huge impact on waterways.

In the HSC Chemistry course the students learn about the human impacts on waterways and the ways that these impacts are monitored and managed.

The excursion to Warragamba Dam and the Orchard Hills Water Filtration Plant reinforced the learning in the classroom.

Upon arriving at Warragamba Dam not only were the students' amazed at how beautiful and pristine the dam looked but also at how massive. The dam is the main supply for all of Sydney's water, and, it is Water NSW's responsibility to maintain the quality of the water. Students were shown the different ways that this was done and the parameters and criteria that were used to monitor the water's quality. Students even carried out tests and analysed data on the water from the dam and a sediment pond.

After exploring the dam wall and having a quick lunch, the students were then taken to the Orchard Hills Water Filtration Plant for a tour.

On this part of the excursion the students saw the "raw water" supplied from Warragamba Dam enter the plant and followed the chemical and physical processes involved in its conversion to the drinking tap water we get in our homes.

During this excursion students gained an insight on the work done behind the scenes that allow us to have clean water. They saw "chemistry in action" and began to appreciate the important role that scientists play every day in our society.



WRITING FOCUS OF THE WEEK

Comma Splicing

There was a time when writing was a precise art form. Everything had to be done perfectly and everything had to be in its place. As technology has moved on, we have all adopted the habit of comma splicing.

Comma splicing is when we divide two main clauses (sentences) with a comma.

It is a hard habit to break and I comma splice constantly. The reason for this is that we now write the way in which we speak. Now while grammarians will inevitably dislike the comma splice, its common usage means that it may eventually be here to stay. Let's look at the following examples:

- 1. My family bakes together every weekend, we then get to enjoy what we make.
- 2. I didn't like the movie, it was way too long.
- 3. Simon felt sick at the restaurant, he wouldn't eat anything.

All three of these 'sentences' are written as we speak to each other. We say the first section, we pause a little and we then say the second section. Because of this pause people's writing has adopted the comma as the appropriate punctuation to separate the ideas. Unfortunately this is incorrect. But why is this important? It's important because identifying comma splicing gives students the opportunity to add variety to their writing.

There are a number of ways to fix these to enhance student writing: Firstly, you could use a semi-colon and practise using different punctuation.

My family bakes together every weekend; we then get to enjoy what we make.

A semi-colon can be used to separate main clauses when they are both related to the same idea.

Secondly, you could use a subordinating conjunction such as: for, and, nor, but, or, yet, and so; also known as FANBOYS.

I didn't like the movie, <u>for</u> it was way too long.

Lastly, you could use a conjunction to begin a sentence.

As Simon felt sick at the restaurant, he wouldn't eat anything.

Students are already big fans of starting their sentences with 'as', but they sometimes forget that a sentence beginning with 'as' *is going to require a comma shortly afterwards* and the idea needs to be completed. Many students would have ended the sentence at restaurant and started a new sentence at "He". This demonstrates an instinct that they know something is wrong, but they just don't know how to fix it properly.

I have to constantly proof read my work to identify my comma splices. When I type, or am writing quickly, I use many of them in order to communicate what I want quickly. Students should also get into the habit of proof reading their work to pick up these errors. It provides them with the opportunity to write in a more sophisticated style.

READING FOCUS OF THE WEEK

Character Studies

A character analysis is a basic form of comprehension that all schools apply at some time or another. Students tend to struggle with what they need to record when they analyse a character, so I decided to provide a basic pattern to follow when they do this. I call it the ABCD method of character analysis.

A – ppearance: This is what the character looks like. Students might like to record physical features or clothing that makes characters stand out. There could be key physical features that help to make up the character's personality.

B – ehaviour: This is how the character acts. What types of things do they do? How do they respond to other characters? Are they kind? Are they aggressive?


C – haracters: This is similar to behaviour but shows how the other characters see this person. Do they think he/she is friendly? Do they treat this character with respect? Are they honest with this character? This can be the longest section because there might be many characters with differing opinions on the character you are analysing. You should single out each important opinion.

— ialogue: This is how the character speaks. Do they speak with an accent? Do they speak assertively or aggressively? Do they consider others when they speak? How does their voice sound?

Students can use this technique to examine characters they are reading about. It may be useful for them to keep a chart in their books with these headings so that they can add to it as they read. Making notes as students read will help them to recall information that is important later.

This program is a three-year fast-tracked course as well as a Cooperative Scholarship sponsored by industry and valued at around \$46,500. Designed with help from industry sponsors, the program offers a business focus, allowing the student to develop an understanding of both business practice and technical skills.

The program prepares students for an IT management role, and boasts a track record of 100% employment rate for its graduates. Graduates also report excellent starting salaries and exciting career prospects. Most students even find work before they graduate.

Students will also undertake two six-month industry placements with different sponsor organisations, one in their first year and the other in their third year.

Successful applicants are selected on a combination of interview and ATAR. It is expected that students will achieve an ATAR around 90 or higher. However, quite often UTS will take in applicants whose ATAR falls in the range of 85 to 99.50.

Step Up Into Teaching (SUIT) is a joint program between the Australian Catholic University and Catholic Education, Diocese of Parramatta (CEDP). It provides Year 11 HSC candidates with an opportunity to complete one university module of a teaching degree while still at school.

The course structure is designed to limit interference with HSC studies. Students will attend SUIT during the September School Holidays. The assessment task will be due in mid October.

Students who successfully complete the SUIT Program and enroll in an undergraduate education program at ACU will receive academic credit for the module, subject to having:

- obtained a Credit average for the SUIT Program;
- applied for teaching at ACU;
- nominated ACU as their first preference.

The CEDP covers all course costs apart from charging a system external course fee of \$250.

Interested students must attend the Information Evening with a least one parent or guardian to ensure an informed decision can be made regarding their application. The Information Evening will have presentations from ACU and CEDP.


