

Not being judgmental or putting the person down was really important. No judgment or disappointment and no criticism is the key.

Mental Illness does not have the stigma associated with it that used to be in the past. People have a better understanding of what Mental Illness is and the ways that they can make it better. If you are unsure about what Mental Illness is, there are many online sites such as Black Dog, beyond Blue and RUOK, which can get you information to help understand what is going on. # **NSW ALL SCHOOLS DIVING**

Four students from St Andrews College proudly represented the school at the recent NSW All Schools Diving Championships. The competition took place on Friday the 6<sup>th</sup> of May at the Sydney Olympic Park Aquatic Centre. It included divers from across NSW and across the three school systems; CCC (Combined Catholic Colleges), CHS (Combined High Schools) and CIS (Combined Independent Schools). In short, it was the best school divers in NSW.



Divers performed a different number of dives depending on their age group with the youngest divers performing four dives and the eldest performing eight. Divers in the 12, 13, 15 and 17+ age groups who wanted to trial for the School Sport Australia (national) event performed one extra dive after the competition which was added to their score. Below is a list of placings. The first placing shows their competition rank while the second placing shows their School Sport Australia (SSA) trial rank.

Jemma France (Year 9) 15-16 Years Girls Platform 5<sup>th</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> (SSA)

Jemma France (Year 9) 15 Years Girls Springboard 5<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> (SSA)

Isabella Carter (Year 8) 14 Years Girls Springboard 8<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup> (SSA)

James Kalogjera (Year 7) 12 Years Boys Springboard 3<sup>rd</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> (SSA) (Note: James had to compete against the 13 Year Boys as well for a SSA rank).

All divers competed beautifully and a special congratulations goes to James who received a bronze medal, presented to him by two time Olympian Melissa Wu. Divers who received an SSA rank of 1, 2 or 3 were selected in the team to compete at the School Sport Australia

championships in July in Lightning Ridge. Amy and Jemma are both first reserves in their respective age groups which is a fantastic achievement.

In addition to her diving, Amy also spent the day officiating as one of a few student judges. This is her second year judging at this level and she did a fantastic job. Mr Weaver also spent his day managing the NSWCCC team while Mrs Weaver did her best to juggle coaching and judging duties.

We are very proud of our diving results and encourage more students to take up this wonderful opportunity next year.

# WRITING FOCUS OF THE WEEK

### **WRITING FOCUS OF THE WEEK – Commas (part 1)**

Last week I talked about comma splicing because many students are choosing to use commas to divide sentences from each other rather than using full stops or other punctuation. This week it seems appropriate to give some examples of when it *is* correct to use a comma and some examples of contentious issues.

You use commas to separate items in a short list.
 "I went to the shops and bought lettuce, a cucumber, some carrots and a bag of potatoes".

BUT... you may also see:

"I went to the shops and bought lettuce, a cucumber, some carrots, and a bag of potatoes".

The second example is more common in American English where the last comma is added before the 'and'. As we have students who come from countries that learn the American use of English, I see these examples a lot. So which is correct? Well...both are correct. There are times in Australian (UK) English that a comma would appear before the 'and' in a list, but normally it would be a much longer list. However, language changes and you have to write in a way that 'feels right'. Therefore either is correct to use.

2) You use commas after introductory clauses or phrases that come before the main clause.

"If the weather is quite bad, school will not start on time".

"As the bus was late, school did not start on time".

"Due to the heavy traffic, school did not start on time".

"When the toilets are blocked, school will not start on time".

The main clause is about school not starting on time; each example adds an introduction that explains why school will not start on time. Identifying the main clause is important because it will help you to arrange your sentences correctly. Many of the mistakes that occur with commas are because of a misunderstanding of what the main clause is.

 Use commas to separate independent clauses from the main clause.

If I use the main clause "Jane is working on Monday", I can use commas to add extra information within the sentence.

"Jane, who was very tired, is working on Monday".

"Jane, the receptionist, is working on Monday.

"Jane, who was absent last week, is working on Monday.

The parts in bold are not able to stand alone as sentences; they are dependent clauses. This means they are dependent on a main clause, also called an independent clause, in order to complete a sentence.

Sometimes students end the sentence at the dependent clause and fail to finish the main clause - creating an incorrect sentence.

# READING FOCUS OF THE WEEK

### **READING FOCUS OF THE WEEK - Finding the Main Idea**

One of the key questions students are asked is – what is the main idea? Students then need to fumble through a convoluted conversation about what they think the main idea is, but fail to explain it fully. Some students will try to re-read the text quickly to see if it will yield further meaning on a second or third read. However, there are some simple steps to follow if you want to identify the Main Idea in a Non-fiction text.

### Step 1: Look at the heading and subheadings

Believe it or not, many students ignore headings and subheadings. If you ask students what the first word of a text is, they'll skip any headings and go right for the body of the subject. Headings and sub-headings are the first place to look for the Main Idea. Sometimes they will explicitly tell you the answer; other times you might have to think a little more, but if you ignore headings and sub-headings then you are making work for yourself.

### Step 2: Look at the Topic Sentence

The topic sentence is normally the first sentence of a text and normally tells you what is going to follow in the paragraph. Sometimes the topic sentence uses key words that you can rephrase to give you the Main Idea.

### Step 3: Look at the last sentence

The last sentence will sometimes summarise what has been said and summarises the main point of the text. If the last sentence doesn't do this in your text, it's nothing to worry about. There are other steps you can use.


# Step 4: What words or phrases are repeated throughout the text?

Finding words or phrases that are repeated through the text might give you a clue as to how to explain the Main idea; you can use the words or phrases in your retelling of the Main Idea.

By following these steps students should be able to come to a better conclusion about what the Main Idea is in a non-fiction text. Easier texts might reveal their Main Idea with only one or two of these steps, but more complex texts may require all the steps to come to a conclusion.

I heard from one of my friends, from softball, about the first trials that I had to go to which were from the CHSSA (Combined High Schools Sports Association). From this trial I was asked to go with the team chosen to try out at the next level. I had to umpire at the NSW All Schools Trials and after only the first day they asked me if I was interested in travelling to Melbourne with the team as they wanted me to umpire for them there.

The Faculty of Engineering Admission Scheme (FEAS) is for the admission of undergraduate students to UNSW Faculty of Engineering degree programs, including the Bachelor of Science (Computer Science) and the Bachelor of Food Science (Honours), however excludes the following degrees:

- Bachelor of Engineering (Honours)/Bachelor of Commerce
- Bachelor of Engineering (Honours)/Bachelor of Laws
- Bachelor of Engineering (Honours) Civil with Architecture
- Bachelor of Engineering (Electrical)/Master Engineering (Electrical)
- Bachelor of Science (Advanced)/Bachelor Engineering (Honours)
- Bachelor of Science (Advanced Mathematics)/Bachelor of Engineering (Honours)
- The Bachelor of Engineering (Material Science and Engineering) offered by the Faculty of Science is also not included in FEAS

Students who achieve an ATAR from 82.00 to 91.95 are eligible for consideration for FEAS. Entry cut-off includes the ATAR plus HSC Subject Bonus Points, UNSW Access Scheme Bonus Points and Elite Athlete and Performers Bonus Points.

Below an ATAR of 92.00 the UNSW Faculty of Engineering recognises that there are a number of factors which signal the potential of students to succeed in engineering programs. These factors include the ATAR, the student's ability in mathematics and

knowledge of physical science, design and problem solving, as well as attitude and motivation toward engineering studies.

If you anticipate achieving an ATAR of 82.00 to 91.95, then to maximise your opportunities for admission to the UNSW Faculty of Engineering your are strongly encouraged to submit an application under the Faculty of Engineering Admission Scheme (FEAS). As part of this process you will upload supporting documentation and apply for an interview. At the interview, you will meet with an academic from the Faculty of Engineering, have the opportunity to ask questions and demonstrate how you are suited to engineering studies.

Gregory B Whitby, Executive Director of Schools — Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta response to the radical funding freeze proposal from the Centre for Policy Development

### **Radical Funding Freeze Proposal**

Government and non-government schools deserve to be appropriately funded to ensure they achieve high quality outcomes for every student in every school.

The Centre for Policy Development's radical proposal to freeze funding for low fee Catholic schools would threaten parents' right to choose a faith-based education for their child.

Every student deserves a base level of educational funding in Australia. A funding freeze would put pressure on school fees at a time when many families in western Sydney are already struggling to make ends meet. Many parents who send their child to a Catholic school in western Sydney make big sacrifices to pay school fees because it is the best fit for their child's educational needs and religious preferences.

Catholic schools receive government funding because they play an integral role in providing education in the community. In western Sydney, Catholic schools educate one in four students. Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta is one of the largest employers in western Sydney with over 5,000 staff. A funding freeze for low fee Catholic schools would not only have an adverse affect on our students and their families, but also our teachers and staff, local business and wider community. It would also put more pressure on the State government to cater for new public school places.

Students and families should not be disadvantaged for choosing a Catholic education for their child. We need to stop pitting non-government and government schools against each other and allow diversity and choice for families in the type of education they want for their children.

# Cooking and Health Group for Newly Arrived Youth

Anglicare Reconnect is running a YHunger program for youth aged 15-21 years which aims to teach young people skills in cooking, eating and health. The program has been developed by NSW Health, and involves four x two hours workshops where young people will learn basic cooking skills, gain knowledge about health and wellbeing and take home two amazing cookbooks.
