FOOD ALLERGY AND ANAPHYLAXIS INFORMATION REMINDER

St Andrews College has several students with severe allergies, many of them to food. Whilst we cannot eliminate foods from the school we can, as a school community, try to reduce the amount of problem-causing foods available. For several years, the school canteens have not sold foods containing peanuts or tree nuts (cashew, almond, walnut etc).

When students with severe allergy reach secondary school, most are more able to care for themselves. They understand more about their food allergy and are more responsible with regard to their everyday management. However, we ask that non-allergic students make it easier by:

- Taking food allergy seriously
- Not sharing food with friends that have a food allergy
- Not bringing to school foods containing peanuts or any type of nuts
- Washing hands thoroughly after eating
- Knowing what foods friends are allergic to
- Getting help immediately if an allergic schoolmate gets sick

Thank you for your support in making life easier for those students with food allergies and/or anaphylaxis.

NB: Anaphylaxis is a severe, life threatening systemic reaction that often involves various areas of the body: skin, respiratory tract, gastro-intestinal tract and cardiovascular system. The most common causes in children is eating food, primarily peanuts, tree nuts, egg, seafood, fish, sesame, milk and soy. Other causes of anaphylaxis may be bee and insect stings, medication and latex.

Student Pedestrian Safety

Students should not be crossing the creek at any time, to do so is dangerous.

SMS absence

A reminder that the College uses a SMS message system for absences. When replying to these, please ensure you include your child's name, the date and reason for absence.

Parking

We have recently had complaints from neighbours about parents parking in driveways to drop off their children – please use the designated drop off areas at both the Senior and Junior campuses.

Cybersafety - Unwanted contact

He asked you to do, what? Unwanted contact is any type of online communication that you find unpleasant or confronting.

The contact can come from online or offline friends or people you don't know.



Unwanted contact can include:

- being asked inappropriate or personal questions by someone you don't know
- being sent offensive, confronting or obscene content
- being asked to send intimate pictures or do things online that make you feel uncomfortable.

How do I deal with it?

• Don't respond and leave the site or chat session.

- Report it to an adult that you trust or to the police, if there is a threat to your safety
- Block the contact or remove them from your friends list.
- Change your profile settings so that your personal details are kept private.
- Don't open messages from people you don't know.
- Keep the evidence. This can be useful in tracking the person posting unsuitable material.

Contact your ISP and/or phone provider, or the website administrator, there are actions they can take to help.

Year 11 and 12 Report

The following letter was sent home with Year 12 students last week.

Year 12 return after completing their Trial HSC and face their final twenty days of schooling and seven weeks to the HSC. Whilst this is a short period of time, it is possibly the most important part of their 13 years at school! Almost all subjects are yet to complete the syllabus and consolidation and revision is occurring in all subjects. It is of vital importance therefore that students remain totally focused on the task at hand, ie to achieve the best possible result in the HSC. In order for all students to achieve this, the following points must be remembered:

- All students are expected to attend school each day. If students are too
 ill to attend school then parents are asked to ring the school that
 morning and provide a note for the Learning Advisor when the student
 returns to school.
- All students are expected to be punctual to school ie arrive before 8.35am each morning, and punctual to each lesson throughout the day.
- All students are expected to attend all their lessons.
- No student is allowed to leave the school grounds without being signed out by a Leader of Learning.
- All rules regarding students driving to school must be followed.
- All students are expected to wear full school uniform.
- No student has the right to disrupt the learning of any other student.
- Childish or unacceptable behaviour will not be tolerated.

The Year 12 Reflection Day, Graduation Mass, Graduation Ceremony and Graduation Ball should hold special memories for Year 12. We want to make it quite clear to all students that it is a privilege to take part in these functions and it would be a great shame for a student to be excluded. However any student who is not prepared to follow ALL of the points listed above or any other school rule will not be taking part in these celebrations.

We have great confidence that Year 12 2014 will demonstrate their maturity over the remaining weeks at school and particularly during the final week.

Year 11 Exams Information Sheet

Please read this carefully. If you do not follow the set procedures you could jeopardise your final Preliminary HSC results.

These exams are compulsory. **Read your timetable carefully**, as you will not be allowed to sit an exam after the event if you **misread the timetable**. During the exam period you need only be at school **when you are scheduled for an exam.** Please understand that this is a **privilege** and should you choose not to follow the procedures on this sheet or any other

school rules you will **lose** this privilege and be asked to attend school as normal.

Wear **full school uniform** during the exam period. The sports uniform may only be worn on Thursdays. If you come into school to see teachers or use the library, you must wear your full school uniform.

Go **straight home** at the completion of each exam in order to use all available time for study. Do not loiter at Westpoint, Woodcroft etc.

If you are **too ill** (not just feeling a little sick or suffering from a cold) to attend an exam you must **RING THE SCHOOL** on the morning of the exam, **BEFORE THE EXAM COMMENCES**, and speak to the relevant subject coordinator or to Mr Frankham. You must then obtain a **DOCTOR'S CERTIFICATE** and as soon as possible, complete an Illness/ Misadventure form and make alternative arrangements with Mr Frankham regarding sitting of the exam. This must happen during the exam period at your next available timeslot.

MOBILE PHONES ARE NOT TO BE TAKEN INTO AN EXAM VENUE.

Please leave your mobile phone at home during the exam period. Taking your mobile phone into an exam room, even if it is switched off, will result in you receiving **ZERO for that exam**.

Come prepared for each exam. Every student needs a STAPLER as well as pens, pencils a ruler and an eraser. For certain subjects you will need a calculator, protractor and compass. Check with your teacher before the exam period as to what equipment you need. You do not need to bring writing paper, the school will supply this. All equipment should be put into a CLEAR PLASTIC SLEEVE. Do not bring pencil cases, glasses cases or calculator cases into the exam room.

Arrive at school at least 25 minutes before the advertised starting time. This means you must be at school by 8.20am for morning exams and by 12.35pm for afternoon exams. No student is to arrive LATE, as it is very disruptive to others.

No student is permitted to leave an exam before the end of the exam and all students are to make a serious attempt at each exam.

Once you enter an exam venue there is to be **NO TALKING** or communication. Whilst sitting at your exam desk you should have your eyes on your paper or towards the front of the room. Any student found cheating will be awarded **ZERO**.

After you have been dismissed from a morning exam and you do not have another, leave the school grounds quickly and quietly as Year 12's are still in class and do not appreciate being disrupted by noise. Remember you can use the library for quiet study.

Students scheduled to sit a morning and afternoon exam on the same day are **NOT** to leave school grounds between exams.

These exams have a large weighting towards your Preliminary HSC so take them very seriously, STUDY HARD and achieve your PERSONAL BEST!!!

YEAR 11 EARTH AND ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE EXCURSION TO LONGNECK LAGOON


