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### DR STEPHEN GLENN AITKEN

### Vale Stephen Aitken Founding Principal of John Paul II Senior High School

In 1981 Stephen Aitken, then a Patrician Brother, was the Founding Principal of John Paul II Senior High School. The school was the initiative of the Patricians to cater for the growing number of students wishing to further their education in Years 11 and 12. The school became a beacon of an adult learning environment for young adults. When Stephen left the College to pursue further studies in USA the school was renowned for nurturing young adults and preparing them well for the future.


Stephen left the Patricians and went on to be Principal at McCarthy Catholic College Emu Plains and Founding Principal at Mackillop Catholic College Warnervale. This last appointment was probably his best work. He established a phenomenal K – 12 College that is a lighthouse for great education on the central coast. He was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Education from the Australian Catholic University a month before his death for his outstanding service to

Catholic education.

Stephen died on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of November 2016 after a long illness. He will be remembered by many Patrician colleagues. ### **Becoming New People**

Reflection from Pope Francis God is seeking us...Are we allowing Him to visit us? To seek us and give us love and happiness? The Pontiff reflected on the great contrast between God's unceasing love for us and His people, and our faithlessness. Francis reminded those gathered that what really pains the Lord's heart is that despite how much He loves us, looks for us and desires our happiness, we do not acknowledge Him. Can any of us really say, 'I know how to recognise the hour in which I have been visited? Does God visit me?" Pope Francis then asked the faithful to make an examination of conscience, to ask whether each one of us listens to the words of Jesus when He knocks on our door and says, "Amend your life!" "Do you make a daily examination of conscience on this? Did the Lord visit me today? Have I heard some call, some inspiration to follow Him more closely, to do a work of charity, to pray a little more? I do not know, so many things to which the Lord invites us every day to meet with us." Given this, the Pope stressed, it is central therefore to recognise when we are "visited" by Jesus, and open ourselves to His love. Pope Francis concluded, praying, "May the Lord give all of us the grace to recognise the times we have been visited, we are visited and shall be visited, so that we open the door to Jesus and so ensure that our heart is more enlarged by love, and that we might therefore serve the Lord Jesus in love." During the four weeks of Advent, we prepare for the celebration of Christ's birth through prayer and reflection. We contemplate the First Coming of Jesus as Saviour, and anticipate his promised Second Coming. ### **KOOL SKOOLS PROJECT**





University gave us an insight of what university life could be like for us. The members of staff at Macquarie University were very kind and interactive, and gave us an excursion that we will never forget.

Next, at lunchtime, we ate Bento. Box lunches are very popular among Japanese kids and adults. Our delicious bento consisted of rice, seafood, chicken, potato salad and lots of Japanese vegetables. This format allows for infinite variations and a nutritionally balanced Bento. Also, we went to Northbridge to go to Tokyo Mart. Tokyo Mart is a Japanese grocery store where you can purchase a lot of Japanese food, such as candy, chocolate and so forth. ### STREAMWATCH VISITS SYDNEY WATER



### Why is water so important?

All living things need water to survive. Clean water is especially important for the environment however polluted water is a health hazard. For this reason it is important that the water quality is monitored and managed. We at St Andrews play a small role in this through Streamwatch.

#### What is Streamwatch?

Streamwatch is a citizen based science water monitoring program that enables community groups to monitor the quality and health of local waterways. It is a long running water monitoring program initiated by Sydney Water and the Sydney Catchment Authority. In 2012 the Streamwatch program was transferred to the Australian Museum but continues to be funded by Sydney Water.

At St Andrews College Streamwatch is run by environmentally concerned Year 12 students who work to monitor the state of our local waterway, Breakfast Creek.

Some of the water quality tests carried out are:
Dissolved oxygen
Phosphate *E.coli*pH
Electrical conductivity
Turbidity



On Tuesday 13 December 2016, the students of the St Andrews Streamwatch team was invited to Sydney Water, West Ryde where they got to see how water is monitored around Sydney. On the visit the students were shown by a field scientist the three types of field sampling vehicles used, what they tested for and the purpose of each. The students were then taken into the different laboratories; Bacteriology, Parasitology, Water Chemistry and Aquatic Ecology; where a scientist from each laboratory described what they tested and explained the meaning of the results.

We would like to thank Julia Bartlett and her team of scientists at Sydney Water for this great opportunity. Not only did the students gain an understanding of the stringent testing that is carried out everyday on our water, but also got to see first-hand science in action.

### WRITING AND READING FOCUS OF THE WEEK

#### FOCUS OF THE WEEK - SUMMER AND LITERACY.

□The end of the year is upon us and the students now depart for 6 weeks of sun and sand. During this time it is unlikely that many students will read for pleasure or choose to read anything at all. It is important that students read at some point during their holiday break. I'm not talking about reading schoolwork or studying, although Year 11 and 12 will need to spend some time looking at their work; I'm talking about simply reading something because it's enjoyable. I know - this is a foreign concept to many children and you'd first have to get them away from their busy lives of hanging out at the shops. But studies show that students who read, even a little over the summer, will come back to school with a much better opportunity of succeeding. With this in mind I have decided to end the vear with some summer literacv tips:

Make sure children have something to read during the summer - put books into children's hands. Remember that even if paper books aren't easily accessible there are a whole range of online reading resources; one of which is the E-library used by the Parramatta Diocese. If you are from a non-English speaking background, the International Children's Digital Library at <a href="http://en.childrenslibrary.org/">http://en.childrenslibrary.org/</a> contains books in languages other than English. There are books in English too, but many otherworldly languages are covered for both fiction and non-fiction topics.

**Get your local public library to sign children up for summer reading -** Get your children to sign up for their local library. The local library offers much more than books these days and it might be useful to get the children enrolled so they can take advantage of the many services – including books!

Take advantage of free summer reading incentive programmes. During the summer there are a number of competitions that encourage children to read. Scholastic, who do the Book Club orders, (<a href="http://www.scholastic.com.au/">http://www.scholastic.com.au/</a>) are one such company. Sometimes the book publishers also run competitions for children to encourage their reading. Try Googling Summer Reading Competitions in Australia for 2016 and see what comes up.

**Turn off the sound and turn on the subtitles** – it seems easier for many children to sit and watch TV for the summer. If you've tried to get them to read, and they just won't take that step, try turning off the sound and turn on the subtitles. One of two things will happen: one, they read the show; or two; they'll leave the room and do something more creative. Either way it's a win!

**Take time out to go somewhere new –** one of the hardest things as a teacher is trying to build general knowledge into a class. Too many times it is assumed that students will know the simplest of details, yet it turns out those details aren't so simple. Take advantage of free days at museums or National Parks and allow the children to experience something new. Following some nature trails will involve a level of thinking skills, map reading and experiencing nature. Museums will give children an opportunity to experience something practical, scientific, arty or creative. All of these will allow children to think, create and evaluate the things they see, form opinions and decide what they like and what they do not.

**Keep a diary or write a blog –** if you're lucky enough to go somewhere interesting these holidays, encourage the children to write a journal, diary or blog about their summer. Not only will it give them a written memory of their experiences, it will give them practice in structuring paragraphs, linking sentences together and writing topic sentences. It will also allow them to use more detailed vocabulary in their writing because they will naturally want to mix up their writing to make it interesting.

Lastly, I hope you all have a safe and pleasant summer. I look forward to seeing everyone back in 2017.

### **EAST TIMOR VISIT**



During the October holidays Mr Phil McBride and two teachers from other Sydney schools left their families in Sydney and made the trip to East Timor.

East Timor is also known as Timor Leste and is about one and an half hours by plane from Darwin. It is one of the world's newest countries becoming independent in 1999. Timor Leste has 1.2 million people most of whom live in poverty.

Why did Mr McBride and the two teachers spend their October holidays in East Timor?

Mr McBride believes there are many reasons for the trip.

One is that during World War II the East Timorese helped the Australian soldiers in their fight against the Japanese. When the last Australian troops withdrew from East Timor, the East Timorese

people paid a terrible price for assisting our troops. I felt we owed a debt to the people of East Timor.

Another reason is a quote from a hero of Mr McBride's Nelson Mandela: "Like slavery and apartheid, poverty is not natural. It is man-made and can be overcome and eradicated by the actions of human beings".

Mr McBride and the other teachers were doing their small part in eradicating poverty in East Timor.

Mr McBride and his teaching companions travelled to East Timor was to teach geometry and trigonometry to students in Same. Same is a village in the central highlands of East Timor. The teaching conditions in Same were very difficult with few resources available. However the students were very motivated and would sometimes work through their lunch break trying to understand a new concept.

In Mr McBride's presentation to St Andrews College students on both assemblies he showed a photo of the East Timorese students using a piece of string, a ruler and chalk to bisect a line on the concrete floor.

In concluding the presentation Mr McBride shared another quote form Nelson Mandela "Overcoming poverty is not a gesture of charity. It is an act of justice. It is the protection of a fundamental human right, the right to dignity and a decent life. While poverty persists, there is no true freedom".

TO THE FAMILIES WHO HAVE CHILDREN THEY WISH TO BE PREPARED FOR THE SACRAMENTS OF PENANCE (RECONCILIATION).

FIRST HOLY COMMUNION & CONFIRMATION IN 2017

In 2011, the Diocese of Parramatta released a revised Sacraments of Initiation Policy for children preparing for the above mentioned sacraments. The process of preparation for these sacraments remains as a parish based, family centred program which creates particular opportunities for parents to continue sharing their faith with their child at the appropriate time. The sequence for the reception of these sacraments has returned to the order that you may remember as a child.

The Sacraments of Initiation are Baptism, First Holy Communion and Confirmation. The Sacrament of Penance, sometimes called Reconciliation or Confession, is also an important part of the journey of faith for all of us. It is necessary to receive this Sacrament before you are able to receive the Sacrament of First Holy Communion.

As with all Sacramental Programs it is essential that parents and children are involved. While the students are supported by religious studies in the schools, the actual preparation takes place on a parish and home level. Parents and children are required to attend Sunday Mass and classes, and parents are helped by facilitators who conduct the sessions.

Each year there are opportunities for your children to receive the Sacraments of Reconciliation, First Holy Communion and Confirmation. This is based on the presumption that they have already received the Sacrament of Baptism, as this is the pre-requisite for all other Sacraments. Usually the Sacrament of Penance is received in Year Two. First Holy Communion may be received the year after the Sacrament of Penance is received. Preparation for the Sacrament of Confirmation may begin when your child has entered Year 5 or Year 6 and have already made their First Holy Communion.

Parents have an essential role in discerning when their children are ready to be prepared for the Sacraments. When they believe this is the case they should present the children for registration in the appropriate Sacramental Program.

There is a definite commitment required of families involved in Sacramental Programs. Parents will have to attend one or two Parent Education Evenings in regard to the Sacraments concerned. There will also be an Enrolment Ceremony conducted during Mass on a Sunday morning. Attendance at the 8:45am Sunday masses and all classes during the Sacramental Preparation Program are compulsory.

#### Please Note: What does 'Parish-Based Preparation Programs' mean?

What this means in practice is that families need to present their children to their own parish community for preparation.

In other words for people to be eligible to receive the sacrament in St. Andrew's Parish, Marayong, they need to fulfill one of the following criteria —

- > The family must live within the parish boundaries of the Parish and / or
- The families need to have chosen this parish as their parish community and this is expressed by ...
  - o their registering as parishioners of this Parish and
  - by their participation in the life of this parish community.

If you do not live within the parish boundaries of St Andrew's, or are not registered as a parishioner of the parish, you will need to explain why you are seeking the Sacraments here at St Andrew's. This should be done before the Registration Night. It will require an appointment with one of the Priests or the Sacramental Coordinator. Attendance at the schools in the parish does not automatically make one a parishioner of this parish. As all Sacramental Programs are parish based, it is normally the case that Sacraments are received in the parish where you live or the parish where you worship and are involved.

If your child was baptised at a Church other than St Andrew's Marayong, you will need to bring along the child's original Baptismal Certificate.

#### What should you do now?

The Program for 2017 is outlined below. Please note in your diaries the Registration Period for each Sacramental Preparation Program you wish to enroll your child for and register in person at the Parish Office during that period. [Only PARENTS can collect a Registration form for their child / children.]

(Choose One) Sunday 19th March, 2017 [8.45am or 12.15pm]

[ Please note – Allocation to the 6pm, 8:45 am or 12:15pm masses will be based on when Registration forms are collected from the parish office.]

#### Sacrament of Confirmation

[For children in Year 5 and above who will have made their First Holy Communion before the Confirmation Geremony.]
