'I give you a new commandment: love one another; just as I have loved you, you also must love one another.'

We can all feel a bit like Charlie Brown when he lamented that: "I love humanity. It's people I can't stand!" It is often easier to love those with whom we don't have to live with day in day out. It is difficult to love those that annoy us in our family, our community or our workplace. It is exactly in these daily relationships that we are challenged to be patient and be Christ - to love. He saw these a little signs of the kingdom of God, the kingdom of love. Vanier came looking for Jesus in the neglected and found life

2019 Unity Dayathon

Thursday June 6th 2019

Thursday the 6th of June (Week 6) marks an important day in the St Andrews College community calendar, with the 2019 Unity Dayathon.

The school asks that each student collects as many sponsors (or donations) as possible on their sponsorship card, which was given out in Learning Group. Each student is asked to aim for a personal target of \$30 in sponsors or \$45 per family.

Unity Dayathon has two purposes, firstly our College is a part of the Quakers Hill / Marayong community and Unity Day is a wonderful opportunity to promote our students cultural heritage and secondly as a fundraiser for the College.

In the past our fundraising has allowed us the opportunity to improve our learning spaces with the provision of air conditioning throughout the College. Last year's we raised funds towards our recently upgraded shade structures. This year's funds will be used to install more shade areas, more water coolers and provide outdoor furniture for the students.

Finding sponsors can be fun and it's not too hard if you know where to look. Here are some suggestions:

Ask neighbours, friends and relatives.

Take your sponsorship form to family get togethers.

Ask your parents to take your sponsorship form to work with them.

Take your sponsorship form to sporting activities like soccer or netball.

Try your friends and group members at your parish, scouts, guides etc.

DO get parents permission to seek sponsors.

DO show your sponsorship form to people.

DO explain what the money is for.

DO accept money if sponsors wish to pay before hand.

DON'T door knock or pester people who do not wish to sponsor you.

DON'T collect sponsorship money after dark or from strangers.

DON'T seek sponsorship in Shopping Centers or other public places.

When approaching someone for sponsorship. Remember to be polite, introduce yourself, name your school and show the person your sponsorship form, try asking this way:

"Hello, my name is _____. I am from St Andrews College and we are having a Unity Day to raise money for our school. Would you please help by sponsoring me?"

A good idea is to suggest an amount a person could sponsor you for. e.g. "Could you sponsor me \$2.00 for participating in our school activities?"

Social media

On a daily basis we are dealing with issues caused on Social Media. Many of these problems occur out of school hours but end up causing problems with students at school.

Are you aware of what your child is doing on Social Media? Many parents are not aware but they need to be as they are the ones who are responsible for their Child's online behaviour. As the person who pays for the device and the connection, the parent becomes responsible for the activity online.

It is very easy for young people to post whatever they like online and unfortunately there is a lack of maturity with many young people and this can be seen in their interaction online. Many Social Media sites are designed for adults and the content is adult in nature. Parents should check the regulations of each site their child is on.

All parents should be checking the online activity of their child to ensure that they are safe online and that the content that they send and receive is appropriate for their age.

Please contact the College if you have any concerns with online activity and your child.

Uniform

As of the start of Term 2, all students are expected to be in full College winter uniform. It is an expectation of the College that all students wear this uniform from the moment they leave home in the morning until they arrive at home in the afternoon.

As it gets colder students may want to add scarfs and gloves etc. Any scarf or gloves must be navy blue or black only. We have a College jumper and blazer and these are the only uniform that should be showing. If this is not enough, I suggest thermal undergarments that could be worn under the uniform. Any non St Andrews uniform worn will need to be removed.

The student's planners have a list of the requirements for uniforms. All students are expected to adhere to these rules.

What's in the student planner?

One of the themes in the planner is ethical living.

The students are asked to ponder, "How do I live my life ethically?" Living ethically means that you think and act positively towards yourself and others, using your moral compass to help you make decisions, we try not to do things for personal gain and are my actions making me a better Christian person.

Ethical behaviours include, empathy, doing selfless acts of kindness, being honest, respecting others rights, listening to others, valuing our environments, doing what you say you are going to do and following through with your word.

Developing a growth mindset is one of the keys to developing resilience. Being optimistic and using positive self-talk is a key to developing a growth mindset.

Key character strengths to concentrate on are spirituality and humour. Ask yourself how your beliefs affect your daily life? Your spirituality is essential for balance in your life. Humour has many physical benefits and assists us developing a positive outlook on life.

FROM THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL TEACHING AND LEARNING

IMPORTANT DATES FOR YEAR 10 2020

Monday June 17 - Parent/Student Subject Interviews

Interviews are 20 minutes with two Leaders of Learning. It is important that each student has the information and guidance they need to be well informed about their decisions for senior schooling.

- Subjects will be placed in lines aiming to give every student the best opportunity to have their nominated subject.
- On occasion however there may be some clashes and students may need to be guided to change a preference, however every endeavour is made to cater for every student.

NAPLAN - YEAR 7 AND 9

As you know, your child participated in NAPLAN Online in Week 3. Regrettably there were some connectivity issues that disrupted your child's experience during testing. Understandably, some students may have been distressed or impacted to an extent that may have affected their performance in the assessment.

The connectivity issues were reported to the national education testing authorities responsible for NAPLAN Online who have now decided that eligible students will have the opportunity to re-sit the tests on **Tuesday 28 May**.

Year 7 may re-sit their Writing and Reading Test. Year 9 may re-sit their Writing Test.

Re-sitting the NAPLAN tests is entirely optional and your child does not have to participate if you do not wish them to do so. In considering whether your child should re-sit the test, please be aware that the result of the second test will be the result that is recorded as your child's result for NAPLAN 2019.

Students were issued with a survey on Google Classroom to indicate their intention to resit the test.

Learning and iPads/Laptops

It was disappointing to see the number of students without a device as they attempted NAPLAN despite consistent reminders and SMS messages in Skoolbag. It caused a great deal of disruption for students who approached the tests by being prepared and ensuring they have complied within expectations.

All students need to have their device with them every lesson every day. It is imperative that every student is equipped for learning and give themselves the ability to be set up for success. It is not satisfactory to be without a device. Also every device needs to be charged until the end of a school day, therefore minimising usage during recess and lunch is encouraged.

TRIAL HSC EXAMINATION TIMETABLE

The Trial HSC Timetable will be discussed with Year 12 students next week. Some students may have two examinations scheduled at the same time. To avoid losing the authenticity of the actual tests, these students will have one exam rescheduled at the next available opportunity. At this time it is important that students have a regular study plan and are working towards achieving their best in their final assessments.

Work has commenced on new lifts being installed on each campus.

The senior campus lifts has been completely removed and the foundation form work is in progress with 70% of the work being completed.

The old Junior Campus lift has been removed and the College is waiting on delivery of a new lift.

This work is due for completion by mid June 2019.

Basketball Courts

Work has commenced on the resurfacing of the Junior outdoor basketball court. The old concrete court will be resurfaced with new coloured cushion surface which is both durable and a non slip textured surface court will be ready for use next week.

The senior court resurfacing is scheduled to commence later in the year (September) as warmer weather is needed for the cushion surface.

Work will also commence on new multi purpose courts on both campuses over the coming months.

YEAR 7 PASTORAL

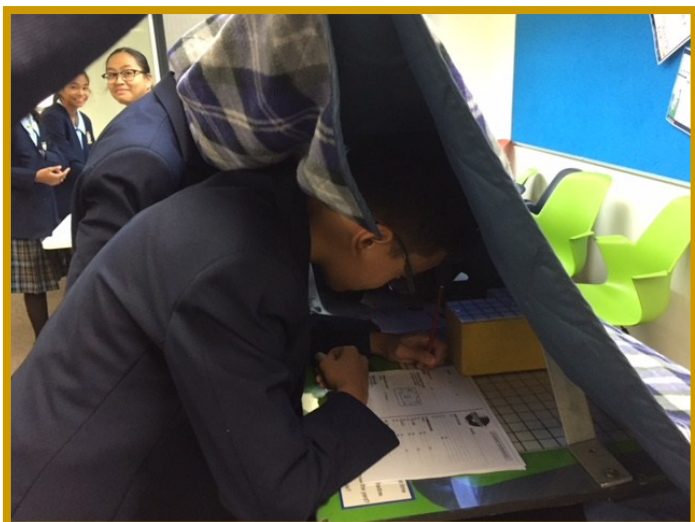
Recently I have had the pleasure to walk around our Year 7 classrooms to see some outstanding work happening.

Not only does the learning happen inside the classroom our social interaction during sport time, carnival events and other extracurricular activities enables a well rounded education.



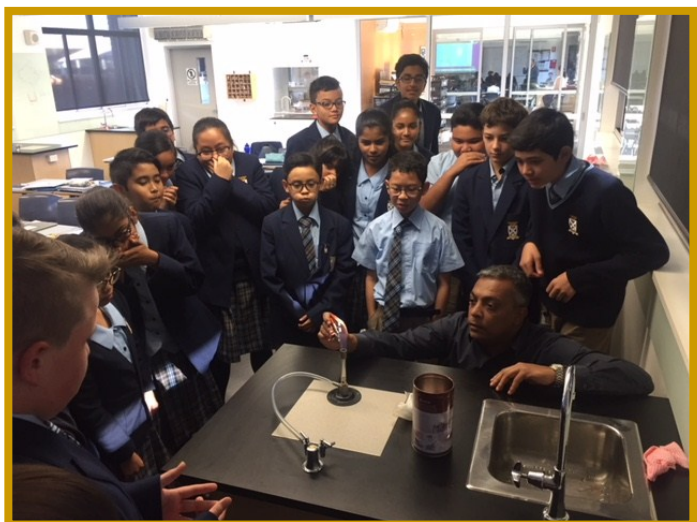

YEAR 11 PASTORAL

In our pastoral lesson on Monday we discussed what it meant to be resilient. In small groups we discussed what resilience meant to us. Resilience is the capacity to recover quickly from difficulties; how tough we can be to bounce back but to also try something different, a different strategy or approach.

We discussed how important a Growth Mindset is where a person's self-belief is centred around the notion that abilities can be developed through dedication and hard work, through a learn at all costs attitude. Success is seen to be due to 35% Ability and 65% Effort.



We then discussed what resilience looked like:

- Stop saying 'I can't'. Say- 'I can't...yet!'
- Don't shy away from difficult tasks
- Focus on effort, struggle and persistence
- Focus on learning and improving, not grades
- Practice your skills and embrace new ones
- Seek challenges
- Work hard
- Understand however good you are, there is always room for improvement
- Put a lot of effort in to the learning process
- Set goals and adjust as needed
- Celebrate your successes, big and small
- Keep trying new things to assist in learning new strategies
- Reflect and focus on strategies that have worked, and haven't

- Embrace feedback and make changes as necessary
- Find inspiration in others - read stories of famous peoples' setbacks and how they persisted through these to achieve great things



As a year group we all developed a Resilience goal, which we have displayed in the playground but also have it written in our Learning Planners. This is to help encourage us and develop our resilience especially as we prepare for our preliminary exams and the HSC. Year 11 is encouraged to continue to strive to achieve this goal throughout the year.

YEAR 12 ENGINEERING STUDIES

On Tuesday, 21st of May 2019, Year 11 and Year 12 Engineering Studies students were given the opportunity to visit University of New South Wales and their School of Materials Science & Engineering.



The Engineering Studies course for the HSC is split into four topics with each having a combination of unique disciplines for students to grasp the variety of engineering fields that can be studied after high school. These include structural, civil, aeronautical and electrical. Though these fields are represented in

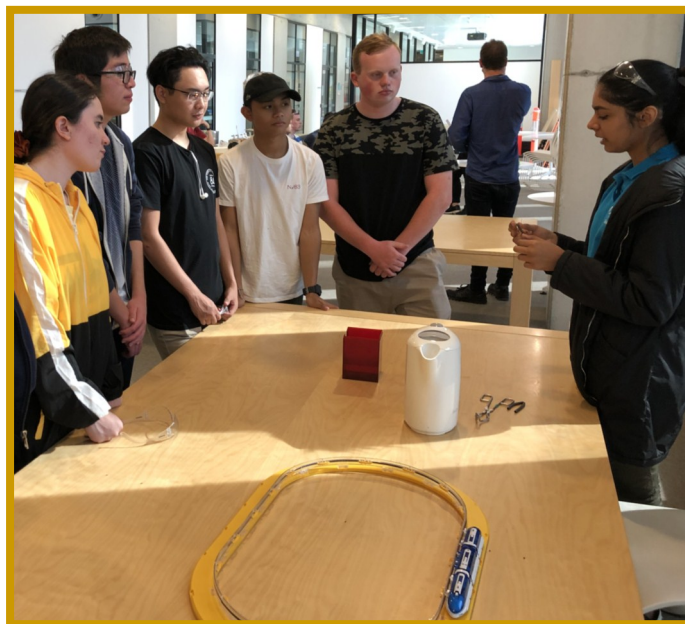
HSC topics respectively, there is one exception of an engineering field that is fundamentally relevant in the whole course. This is materials.

Engineers must be able to determine the appropriate resource material that uses its properties for such applications. Materials Science and Engineering focuses on the study of understanding and interpreting materials for real life applications, including polymers and composites, ceramics and metals. Materials Engineers are consulted to work collaboratively with other engineers of different fields to figure out the best material to use for certain applications, with economic and ethical boundaries to consider.

There is also the opportunity to work in Research and Development to develop innovative materials that can be used in the real world. With the relevance of studying materials in Engineering Studies, students have been able to better understand its importance for the HSC course and future courses.



The day started with a small lecture informing students about the engineering field of materials and the available course offered by UNSW, Materials Science and Engineering. Afterwards was a tour of the MSE Building built in 2015 located in Kensington at the main campus. This recently built facility is equipped with all possible laboratory equipment made for experiments and construction of materials.



We went inside one of its many rooms. This room was used for microscopy work where we saw the Vickers Hardness test firsthand. This is a machine that uses electron microscopes and compressor machine to analyse material's hardness.

Afterwards was the Charpy Impact test which analyses a metal's toughness and its resistance to

impact. These material tests have been studied in the Engineering Studies course and seeing these firsthand tests have improved our understanding and functions of these types of analyses. We then had a break with lunch and we returned to the MSE building where we were separated into rotating

groups led by university students and were each given demonstrations of materials innovations. Presentations developed our understanding of the importance of materials testing and analysis as well as scientific innovations including electromagnetic trains, hydrogen fuel and hydrogels. The day was then finalised with a tour of the whole campus and further information about University including available courses and scholarships and lifestyle.

Many thanks to Mr Robson for this opportunity and a sincere thank you to Mr Kennaugh for allowing this excursion to be possible. Also thanks to UNSW and their School of Materials Science and Engineering for hosting the tours and the hands-on experience of engineering and materials. Encouraging student involvement in science and engineering careers should motivate more enrolments in the future.

All Schools Diving and Swimming

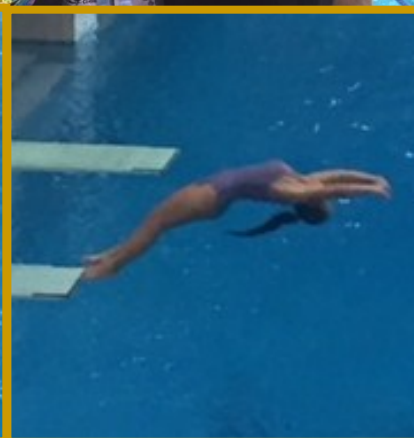
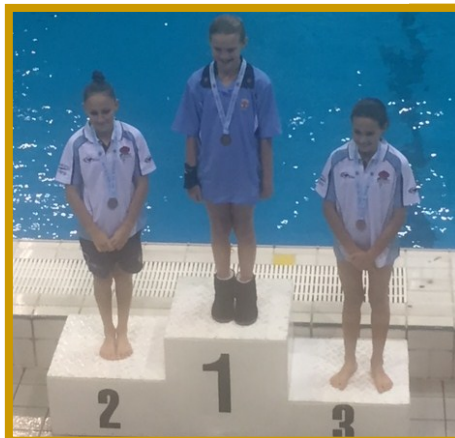
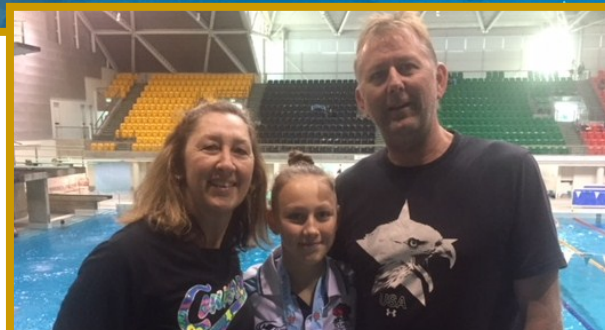
