Trinity is a "Love-fest"

The Spirit of truth will lead us to complete truth.

Everything the Father has is mine.

~ John 16: 12-15 ~

Each of us is a space for the Spirit to inhabit, a place for the Father to live, a face on which the light of Christ Jesus shines. As a river carries water, we carry God. As the sun carries light, we

shine out God. As a face mirrors a personality, we mirror God. This is the glory of God - Father, Son and Holy Spirit. We are one with this creating, redeeming, sustaining God, who seeks us out. Even before the rest of creation, we were the apple of God's eye. Before anything else was created, we came to birth in God. Relationships are at the very centre of who God is and who we are. Relationships are God's and our core business. God cannot actually be God without others, (the Trinity) and without us and we cannot be without God and others! God is not alone. We are never alone!

Last week was Refugee Week. We do not often talk about sin against the Holy Spirit but it still exists. Miroslav Volf says 'Sin is a refusal to embrace others in their otherness and a desire to purge them from one's world, by ostracism or oppression, deportation or liquidation... the exclusion of the other is the exclusion of God.' It is practiced when we give up, or give in, or surrender to hopelessness. It can be reflected in choosing to live dull, drab, safe, complacent, mediocre lives, when the Spirit urges us to be more. We are floating on a sea of grace every waking moment of our life - if our eyes are open.

Student's safety while travelling to and from school.

Do not speed around the school zones as children are unpredictable and may not look for you in traffic.

What's in the Planner?

The main focus this week is learning to work collaboratively. There are many great opportunities to learn when we work with others. We learn to share, learn from, appreciate others and value their input. It is an opportunity to combine your strengths with others' strengths.

When working in groups the team needs to take on different roles. These roles include

Organiser- creates the framework so all are involved

Starter- gets things started

Recorder- collects relevant information

Verifier- Checks for accuracy

Listener- thinks about the learning happening

Timer- keeps everyone on track

Coordinator- ties everything together

Finisher- presents the task in a stylish fashion

Energiser- encourages everyone to push on

Critic- provides honest feedback on the learning process

The different roles should be allocated by persons' strengths. Together the combined strengths create a strong team capable of great learning.

Time targets

Setting time targets to complete tasks is a way to alleviate stress and help develop your academic abilities.

To develop good habits with time targets we use the Five "E's" of learning- Engage, explore, explain, elaborate and evaluate.

Engage- record dates, brainstorm ideas about the task, get assessment criteria. Plan your task

Explore- locates resources, collect information, begin research

Explain- develops sentences then paragraphs. Develop your draft and ask teacher to look at it

Elaborate- analyse the comments from your draft, improve phrasing and vocabulary. Discuss interpretation with family or friends

Evaluate- assess feedback and complete final task

Year 10 Subject Selections

Year 10 have been busy selecting their subjects for Year 11 2020. It is imperative that students maintain their application from now until the end of the year to ensure they are well equipped for the Preliminary courses. If students are still concerned about decisions they are making, they should consult either mdeschamps@parra.catholic.edu.au or gosterlund@parra.catholic.edu.au or their Year Leader of Learning.

Students will be involved in a Year 11 orientation week in Term 4 to trial their subjects.

Assessment Tasks - NESA requirements must be followed.

A number of students are receiving N Awards due to not submitting an assessment task. It is imperative that students complete all tasks to the best of their ability. If students receive an N Award, they are still expected to do the task even if the task will result in a 0 mark. If a student does not complete the task after being awarded an N Award, they will receive another N Award. Three N Awards will result in the student failing to qualify for the award of the ROSA.

If a student is absent for any reason on the day an assessment is due, the student must obtain either a doctors certificate or other documentation. Upon the

first day the student arrives back at school, they must go immediately to the office and fill out a Misadventure Form with the documentation (Doctors Certificate) attached. The assessment task must be attached if it is a submission with the misadventure. If the task is an in class task, the student must fill out the misadventure, attach the documentation and go to the KLA Leader of Learning by recess to arrange how the task will be completed. Failure to follow the procedures will result in a 0 mark achievement and the student will receive an N Award and the assessment task will still need to be completed.

If a task is meant to be submitted in Google Classroom and the student is absent, the student is asked to put a note into the assessment task, and upload the task the student has completed at that time via a scan or photograph. This is particularly important in Year 11 and 12. This is important as every student has an assessment for a minimum of two weeks before an assessment is due.

Year 9 Subject Selections 2020

Students will receive their Subject Selection Booklet shortly. Students are encouraged to read all the electives on offer.

The Subject Selection Market will be held on: August 12. An invitation letter will be sent to parents in Week 1 Term 3.

- It is important for students to avoid thinking of choosing a subject because of friends as there might be multiple classes and students may not be with friends.
- It is important students understand that teachers are not allocated to classes until much later in the year. Therefore do not choose a subject based on the teacher.
- Instead choose subjects which interest you and you wish to gain skills in
- Some subjects are a great prerequisite for Year 11 and 12, therefore ask teachers for advice if you are interested in particular subjects.

YOUNG WOMEN'S LEADERSHIP SEMINAR

The Women's Leadership Program is an annual event, held in the New South Wales Parliament House and is centred around inspiring sturdy foundations for young women as they navigate their way through the complexities of leadership, the intricacies of personal growth and the art of embracing the unknown. The day featured numerous guest speakers, each of whom were women dictating their lives as leaders, they shared their stories, their pain, their jubilation, their fears but most importantly they illuminated each of our young minds to the beauty of passion and the inextricable power of authenticity.



This year Michelle and I were fortunate enough to attend the program, with the first guest speaker being Nina, one of the seventy seven female scientists who collaborated to produce Homeward Bound. Homeward Bound was a scientific expedition to the Antarctic peninsula, that aimed to celebrate women from every crevice of our vast world. These women ventured to the world's coldest, driest continent to spark awareness on the lack of female representation in leadership and the underestimation of their potential to contribute to policies and decision making, especially on issues such as climate change.

She spoke of the challenges that consistently persisted throughout her journey, she spoke of the doubt that consumed her at times and the fear that almost held her in place. Yet, it was her vulnerability that enabled her strength to shine, for she spoke of her hardships but more importantly she spoke of her growth. She spoke of the women who surrounded her, unyielding to the biting cold of the weather, who remained always warm and open and her biggest source of inspiration. She spoke to each of us, to value one another, and to value ourselves and this journey we commit ourselves to, in order for growth.

We were then introduced to three Members of Parliament, each from a different party. Who provided insight into their roles as leaders within our country. They aimed to instill in us the power of our voices, the undeniable potential within each individual that is so greatly valuable to the progression of our nation. They shared their stories, their journeys and although each woman's experience was starkly different to the others, their character shone through the same. Passion and authenticity, are stepping stones to leadership, but in each of these women we see their most significant strength, which is in fact that they are each women.

The day in its entirety, spoke volumes to me, in the sense that it defined the evolution of women in leadership. It nurtured the potential held by every young woman within that room, and provided a frame of resilience and support that will carry us into our futures. It was an experience that was irreplaceable in every aspect, and one that will forever hold my gratitude.


